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Westminster Choir College of Rider University is a private coeducational institution in historic Princeton, New Jersey. The 23-acre campus is located at 101 Walnut Lane in the heart of Princeton. The campus comprises 13 buildings and on-site parking.

What is a campus security report?

The Campus Security Act – Legal requirements

The Campus Security Act requires *colleges and universities to:*

- publish an annual report every year by October 1 that contains three years of campus crime statistics and certain campus security policy statements;
- disclose crime statistics for the campus, public areas immediately adjacent to or running through the campus, and certain non-campus facilities and remote classrooms. The statistics must be gathered from campus police or security, local law enforcement, and other University officials who have “significant responsibility for student and campus activities;”
- provide “timely warning” notices of those crimes that have occurred and pose an ongoing “threat to students and employees;” and
- disclose in a public crime log “any crime that occurred on campus...or within the patrol jurisdiction of the campus security department and is reported to the campus police or security department.”

The Rider University Department of Public Safety is responsible for preparing and distributing this report. We work closely with several other internal departments and outside agencies, such as the Associate Dean of Students Office, Residence Life Office, and the Princeton Borough and Princeton Township Police Departments, to compile this information.

We encourage members of the Rider University community to use this report as a guide for safe practices both on and off campus. The Rider University Department of Public Safety

The safety and well-being of the campus and community are the primary responsibilities of the Department of Public Safety. The department is staffed by a director, assistant director/captain, assistant director/coordinator of public safety, and public safety officers who cover the Lawrenceville and Westminster Choir College campuses. Public safety officers patrol both campuses 24 hours a day, 365 days a year. These public safety

officers do not have police powers. The public safety officers on the Westminster campus patrol on foot. The main Communications Center is located on the Lawrenceville campus and is staffed with trained and certified communications officers who answer calls for service, dispatch officers and other emergency services to incidents, register motor vehicles on campus, handle switchboard calls late at night until 8:00 am, and monitor intrusion detection and fire alarms. Officers undergo continuous training and are qualified in first aid, CPR for the Professional Rescuer, and fire response. The Department of Public Safety Office on the Westminster campus is located in Bristol Chapel and never closes. That office (x8315) can be dialed from an on-campus phone for non-emergencies. Westminster campus community members may contact the Department of Public Safety by phoning 896-7777 (x7777 from an on-campus phone) in an emergency or 896-5029 (x5029 from an on-campus phone) for non-emergencies. The communications officer receiving the call will dispatch the Westminster public safety officer.

Campus policing and security policies

Rider University Department of Public Safety members are non-sworn university employees who do not have police powers. These officers enforce university policies. The public safety officers who have not previously graduated from an accredited police academy prior to joining Rider University attend a 40 hour training program sponsored by the State of New Jersey College and University Public Safety Association. This program provides officers with a basic understanding of campus law enforcement and security. All officers undergo additional continuous training and are qualified in first aid, CPR for the Professional Rescuer, and fire response.

The Rider University Department of Public Safety has excellent working relationships with Lawrence Township Police (for Lawrenceville campus) and both Princeton Borough and Princeton Township Police (for Westminster campus), as well as county and state police agencies. Information is disseminated between these agencies and the Department of Public Safety in an on-going effort to maintain a safe environment. The positive cooperation between the University and outside law enforcement and emergency response agencies has led to mutual aid and support when needed. Local police officers work at various University events throughout the year. All serious matters are promptly reported to the local police. At the request of a victim, the Department of Public Safety will provide assistance by contacting the local police. In any event, an accounting of the incident will remain on file at the Department of Public Safety Office and will be included in the annual report of crimes. The Department of Public Safety reviews all incidents reported to its office to determine reportable crimes as defined in *The Handbook for Campus Crime Reporting*. The Department also coordinates with local police in classifying and compiling reportable offenses.

Monitoring and recording criminal activity at off-campus locations

Rider University also works closely with local law enforcement agencies for crimes and other serious incidents occurring off campus that may involve our students. The Department of Public Safety will promptly act on any information received from outside agencies concerning members of the Rider community and will conduct an investigation on information received. Findings of that investigation concerning student misconduct will be forwarded to appropriate University offices, to include the Office of the Associate Dean of Students for any disciplinary action. This includes students engaged at off-campus locations of student organizations officially recognized by Rider University, as well as student organizations with off-campus housing facilities. If the University is notified of a situation in which a campus community member is the victim of a crime, the Department of Public Safety may issue a Timely Warning Notice, detailing the incident and providing tips so that other community members may avoid similar incidents.

Reporting Criminal Incidents and other emergencies

Violations of campus social regulations, criminal law, and other emergencies should be reported directly to the Department of Public Safety.

Resident students may first confer with residence life staff members for incidents occurring in residence halls (Residence Life). This does not preclude the ability to notify and file a report with the Department of Public Safety and/or the local police.

Rider University community members have reporting options available to them when reporting crimes and other serious incidents. Those options include formal complaint reports, informational reports, and confidential reports. A formal complaint report includes the taking of statements, an incident report prepared, an investigation conducted, and if suspects are identified, the filing of campus charges. Suspects identified as non-community members are issued a letter of Persona Non Grata. The formal complaint report and completed investigation are forwarded to the Office of the Associate Dean of Students for resolution, which may include a campus hearing on the matter. These hearings are not designed to reflect or duplicate the public court procedure which handles questions of criminal and civil law. More information regarding campus judicial procedures may be obtained by contacting the Office of the Associate Dean of Students at x8263, through the student handbook, *The Source*, or on line at www.rider.edu. An informational report may be taken when the community member does not wish to pursue formal charges and investigation, and wants to have an accounting of the incident on file. A confidential report may be taken when the community member does not want his/her identity publicly revealed in the reporting of a crime or other serious incident. Pastoral and professional counselors, if and when they deem appropriate, may inform persons they are counseling of any procedures to report crimes on a voluntary, confidential basis for inclusion in the annual disclosure of crime statistics. University administrators who are

notified of crimes or other serious incidents will notify the Department of Public Safety for further action and statistic inclusion.

The **Department of Public Safety** is available at all times to assist students and other members of the campus community. **The emergency phone number is 609-896-7777 (the non-emergency number is 609-896-5029).** Those numbers will connect you to the main Communications Center. If using one of the Westminster campus phones, dial x7777 for emergencies and x5029 for non-emergencies. If you want to call the Bristol Chapel Public Safety Office, dial x8263 from an on-campus phone. Remember to dial x7777, not x8315, in an emergency. All calls to the Communications Center are electronically recorded and preserved, as are dispatch transmissions and patrol responses. There is a code-blue emergency phone on the Westminster campus, located by the D Lot, that provides direct connection to the main Communications Center of the Rider Public Safety Office by pressing the large button.

Rider's Response

Upon receiving your call, public safety officers will either take your report at the Department of Public Safety Office in Bristol Chapel or respond to your on-campus location. Public safety officers are responsible for a full range of campus safety services, including all medical emergencies, fire emergencies, building security, traffic accidents, enforcement of liquor laws, and the use of controlled substances, crime reports, investigations, and all other incidents requiring security assistance.

Student violations of University regulations are normally handled through the Office of the Associate Dean of Students or other campus measures (see *The Source*, the student handbook). Sanctions for violative behavior range from minor restrictions to expulsion from the University. For protective purposes, the victims of student misconduct can request a change in their living arrangement or academic schedule. Pursuing a matter through University procedures does not limit or exclude options to involve local police authorities or to take other measures.

Access to Facilities

The Westminster campus is an open campus located in the heart of Princeton. Public safety officers conduct routine building checks during patrol. All campus buildings are locked by a public safety officer at or about 11 p.m. and re-opened at or about 7 a.m. Access to locked facilities is permitted only through contacting a public safety officer and presenting a current Westminster I.D. card. All Westminster community members are issued a photo I.D. card that they must carry at all times and present to public safety officers upon request. The Westminster I.D. cards are also required for the use of services at the bursar's office, coffee house, and dining commons, as well as access into the residence halls.

There are three residence halls and various practice facilities on campus. Access to exterior doors of the residence halls is controlled by a Card Access System of electronically encoded photo ID cards. The Office of the Associate Dean of Students is responsible for the issuance and operation of the Card Access System. The Department of Public Safety will issue temporary I.D. cards for lost or stolen cards after normal business hours. Community members are encouraged to dial x5029 or x8315 for after hours I.D. card issuance. The responsibility for the campus key lock system falls under the Facilities Management Office (x8303). In the event of a key or lock problem after normal business hours, the Department of Public Safety should be contacted.

The Residence Life Office, Facilities Management, and the Department of Public Safety work closely together in monitoring and maintaining safe residential living facilities.

Safety Matters

The **Department of Public Safety** works to create and maintain a safe and secure environment 24 hours a day. Sodium vapor lights designed to enhance visibility illuminate all parking areas, buildings, and walkways. Routine campus lighting survey reports are conducted and forwarded to Facilities Management. Community members are encouraged to report any lighting deficiencies to Facilities Management at x8303. The Department of Public Safety is provided an on-call list of Facilities Management personnel in the event of any facilities emergencies after normal business hours. The department offers a nighttime escort service for community members traveling alone on campus. Dial x5029 for an escort to your on-campus location by a public safety officer. Also available are year round fire safety demonstrations, crime prevention programs, and self-protection seminars, which are designed to inform students and staff about fire safety tips, security procedures and practices, as well as current crime statistics. These seminars also encourage students and employees to be responsible for their own safety and security and that of others and to report any suspicious activities or crimes that occur on campus immediately to the Department of Public Safety.

Timely Warning Notices

Rider University firmly believes in the use of timely warning notices as a means of preventing crimes or other serious incidents, as well as to notify community members of crimes on campus and in the surrounding area. Members of the Rider community are encouraged to immediately report crimes and other serious incidents to the Department of Public Safety so that a campus timely warning notice can be issued, if warranted. Administrators who are informed by campus community members of a crime or other serious incidents will notify the Department of Public Safety. The Department of Public Safety, in collaboration with the Associate Vice President for Student Affairs & Dean of Students, and the Associate Dean of Students will determine when to issue a timely warning notice. Other administrators, such as the Provost and the Director of Public Relations, may also play a role in that decision. Notification distribution may include

voice mail, e-mail, postings, and/or internal release to campus radio or newspaper, if deemed appropriate. Alerts are posted in pre-designated bulletin boards throughout campus as well as in the Department of Public Safety Office.

Daily Crime Log

The Department of Public Safety maintains a written, easily understood Daily Crime Log. The Daily Crime Log records, by the date the crime was reported, any crime that occurred on campus, on a noncampus building or property, on public property, or within the patrol jurisdiction of the Department of Public Safety. This log includes the nature, date, time, and general location of each crime reported to the Department of Public Safety, as well as the disposition of the complaint, if known at the time the log is written. The Department of Public Safety will make an entry or an addition to an entry to the Daily Crime Log within two business days of receiving the report, except in certain circumstances as prescribed within the Campus Security Act. The Department of Public Safety will disclose information once the adverse effect has been eliminated. The Daily Crime Log is available for public inspection and contains the most recent 60 day period. Any portion of the Daily Crime Log older than 60 days will be made available within two business days of a request for public inspection.

Crime prevention education and awareness

Our mission in the Department of Public Safety is to provide members of the University community with a safe and pleasant environment in which to live, work and learn. Specifically, we have the responsibility of protecting life and property, preventing and detecting crime on campus, and providing essential safety services to the University community. Firm but reasonable enforcement of University regulations, coupled with crime prevention and safety programs, help us to meet these responsibilities. Crime prevention is a high priority of the department as well as the University. We encourage community members to be aware of their surroundings, both on and off campus, and to develop self-esteem which aids in minimizing their chances of becoming victims. We further encourage community members to take responsibility for their own safety and that of others. The department routinely conducts security surveys and vulnerability assessments. In an on-going effort to be pro-active in preventing crime and in educating the community, the department offers several programs and services, to include:

- Park, Walk and Talk Program*: Establishing personal contact with members of the University community in a non-crisis situation helps foster communication and recognition between the community and the Department of Public Safety. Public safety officers routinely visit residence halls and University offices for discussion and exchange of ideas.
- *Operation Identification*: Members of the department will engrave or tag personal or University property free of charge. Such engraving or tagging of property aids in deterring thefts and also helps law enforcement officials trace

stolen property. All community members are urged to take advantage of this fast, easy way to protect belongings.

Escort Service: University community members often return from an off-campus event or visit another building on campus late at night. Community members are encouraged to contact the Department of Public Safety at x5029 to receive an escort.

Educational Programs: Educational programs, including Fire Safety Demonstrations, Crime Prevention Programs, and Self Protection Seminars are available for any campus member, group, or organization. These programs are free of charge and offered throughout the year. Anyone interested in a program of this nature is asked to contact the Department of Public Safety at x5029.

Liaison with local police authority: The Rider University Department of Public Safety has an excellent working relationship with the local police authorities. Information regarding investigation is often shared through informal meetings. In serious criminal cases, we work with local police investigators.

Crime Prevention on the Rider University Campus Brochures: This is a series of brochures that provides crime prevention tips and responses. Topics include home and office security, your safety and security, operation identification and personal property record, and credit card safety. These brochures are available free of charge from the Department of Public Safety.

Residence halls fire prevention information

Smoke detectors and sprinkler systems are installed in all residence halls. Smoke detectors are located in each student room and in common areas. The smoke detectors and sprinkler systems are connected to a building fire alarm control panel which in turn is connected to the Department of Public Safety. The department is responsible for monitoring the fire alarm system. In addition, the department conducts at least two fire drills from each residence hall throughout the academic year. All occupants are required to evacuate the building until the all clear signal is given. Campus violators are subject to disciplinary action and visitors may be issued letters of Persona Non Grata. Various fire safety violations and penalties are identified in the student handbook, *The Source*. Rider also provides a fire prevention smokeout training program in which a predetermined hallway is filled with stage smoke from a smoke machine, maintained and operated by the department, to simulate a smoke filled condition in a building. Participants are taught safe evacuation techniques in a controlled environment. This popular program is available throughout the year.

Alcohol Policy

Rider University seeks to encourage and sustain an academic environment that both respects individual freedoms and promotes the health, safety, and welfare of all members of its community. In keeping with these objectives, the University has established a policy governing the possession, sale, and consumption of alcoholic beverages on campus. This policy conforms to the laws of the State of New Jersey.

Underage possession and/or consumption of alcoholic beverages are violations of Rider regulations and/or state laws. The furnishing of alcohol to those under 21 years of age is prohibited. Consumption and possession of alcoholic beverages is a privilege authorized in designated locations on campus only. No grain alcohol, kegs or beer balls/bowls, regardless of amount of content, are permitted.

Violators of campus alcohol policy receive several sanctions, including attendance at alcohol education classes conducted at the Counseling Center.

A full statement of the University alcohol policy is published in *The Source*, and is available on request from the Office of the Associate Dean of Students. Information from *The Source* can also be obtained online at www.rider.edu.

Drug and Alcohol Abuse Education Programs

Consistent with its educational mission, Rider helps its members find alternatives to alcoholic beverages for promoting social interaction and stress reduction.

In addition, the University provides services and resources for those who experience alcohol and/or drug related difficulties. The Counseling Center employs a full-time substance abuse coordinator to administer Rider's alcohol and drug education programs. Employees may contact the Employee Assistance Program at 609-396-5877 or 609-689-0950.

The use and/or possession of illegal drugs and narcotics are violations of Rider University regulations as well as certain federal, state, and local statutes. The University recognizes the right of such law enforcement agencies to enforce these laws on the Rider University campuses, including executing search and arrest warrants.

Members of the University community are urged to become aware of the laws regarding drugs and narcotics and to consider carefully the ramifications of violating these laws. Additional information on the drug and narcotic policy is available in *The Source*, available either in hard copy or online at www.rider.edu.

Campus Sexual Assault Victim's Bill of Rights

Rider University recognizes that the impact of violence on its victims and the surrounding community can be severe and long lasting, thus the University supports the New Jersey statute establishing this Campus Sexual Assault Victim's Bill of Rights. The law articulates requirements for policies, procedures and services designed to insure that the needs of victims are met and that colleges and universities in New Jersey create and maintain communities that support human dignity. For further information about the University's stance on sexual assault or sexual harassment, contact the Department of Public Safety, the Student Health Center, the Residence Life Office, the Counseling

Center, the Office of the Associate Dean of Students, and/or Human Resources. Rider University created a brochure entitled “Sexual Assault – What to do when someone needs help”. Copies of that brochure can be obtained from the Department of Public Safety or the Student Health Center. Information on sexual assault can also be obtained in the student handbook, *The Source*, or online at www.rider.edu.

Reporting a sexual assault

Whether you have been victimized now or in the past, it is important to get help as soon as possible. Telling someone is an important step in the recovery process. It’s helpful to talk to a counselor or someone who has experienced the same thing. They can help you get through the experience. You may want to write down what you remember as soon as possible.

If the occurrence just took place, and there is a possibility you will report the crime to the police, do not bathe, change or wash your clothes, and women should not douche. Clothing, bed covers, and sheets may contain DNA which is critical evidence. You should also seek medical attention as soon as possible. Not all injuries are immediately apparent. A medical examination may be necessary to determine internal injuries, sexually transmitted disease, or in the case of women, pregnancy. This service is available at the hospital at any time. You may decide to go to one of the designated rape treatment centers, which are: Robert Wood Johnson University Hospital in Hamilton, Capital Health System @ Helene Fuld, Capital Health System @ Mercer Medical Center, or Princeton Medical Center in Princeton for a rape examination which allows evidence to be collected in case you wish to prosecute. If you go to one of the designated hospitals, the sexual assault response team (SART) will be activated. The evidence will be secured whether or not you decide to prosecute. If you choose to have police involvement, they will want to interview you before or after the examination. A rape care advocate will be there to assist you through the process.

In light of these and the following options, it is important to know that you are free from any pressure from campus personnel to:

- report the crimes if you do not wish to do so
- report crimes as lesser offenses than you perceive the crime to be
- refrain from reporting crimes
- refrain from reporting crimes to avoid unwanted personal publicity.

Consider the following additional OPTIONS which are available to you:

- *Womanspace:* If you call the Womanspace 24 hour crisis and information hotline at 609-394-9000, a trained and sensitive counselor will assist you. An advocate will help you through the process and at your request will accompany you to a designated hospital, public safety, or the police station. The advocate can come to campus or will talk to you over the phone to help you sort out options. All contact with Womanspace is confidential.

- *Student Health Center:* is located in Taylor Hall or by calling 921-7100 (x8222) weekdays. The nurse will provide you with a safe and supportive environment and provide immediate medical attention for any physical injury. The nurse will also call Womanspace if you wish.
- *Counseling Center:* is located in Williamson Hall or by calling 921-7100 (x8275) weekdays. You will be able to make an appointment with a professional counselor for a private and confidential session.
- *Public Safety:* is located in Bristol Chapel and is staffed 24 hours a day, every day. The emergency number is 896-7777 and the non-emergency number is 896-5029. Both of these numbers dialed will connect you with the communications officer located at the Lawrenceville campus, who will then relay your request to the Westminster officer. Should you wish to contact the Public Safety Office located in Bristol Chapel in a non-emergency, you may dial x8315. Public safety officers are specially trained to deal with rape and sexual assault cases. Public safety can call Womanspace and/or escort you to the Student Health Center (during the weekday), if you wish. The Department of Public Safety will also assist you in contacting the police, should you decide. Public safety will prepare a report which can be kept confidential or can be used for campus and/or legal proceedings, should you decide to pursue further action.

Princeton Borough Police Department: is located at 1 Monument Drive (adjacent Route 206) in Princeton or by calling 924-4141 or in an emergency call 911. *Princeton Township Police Department* is located at 1 Valley Road or by calling 921-2100 or in an emergency 911. A uniformed officer will go to either the Public Safety Office at Bristol Chapel or to your on campus location, normally accompanied by a public safety officer. The police will explain their role and how they can assist you.

However, the final decision of how to proceed is yours. No one from the University will make you do anything that you do not wish to do.

What happens later

On campus:

- You have the option to request that the University take reasonable steps to prevent unwanted contact between you and the person who victimized you which may include a change in residence or class schedule.
- If you or the person who victimized you is a member of the Rider community you may choose to pursue this matter on campus by using procedures available through Rider's harassment policy or the Code of Social Regulations. Both of these policies appear in the student handbook, *The Source*, which can also be viewed online at www.rider.edu.
- An internal hearing before a board of Rider University representatives is generally required. At this hearing, you and the accused are both entitled to have witnesses and assistance present. In an effort to support and protect you as well as the campus community, various outcomes may result if the hearing

authority is convinced that misconduct occurred. Such outcomes can include certain restrictions up to and including expulsion from the University. Both parties are informed of the outcome of the hearing.

- Pursuing this matter through Rider procedures in no way limits or excludes your options to file public law suits in criminal or civil courts. To learn the differences between these systems, contact the Office of the Associate Dean of Students (x8263) or the Affirmative Action Officer (896-5140).

Off Campus: The Princeton Borough Police Department (924-4141) or the Princeton Township Police Department (921-2100) can explain to you the process and proceedings should you choose to pursue criminal or civil action.

If you are a friend of the victim:

Whatever option the victim may choose, be supportive! The victim needs a calm, good listener, not someone who tells him/her what to do. The victim needs to know he/she is not to blame for what happened.

Definition of Categories

Crime Definitions from the Uniform Crime Reporting Handbook

Arson-Any willful or malicious burning or attempt to burn, with or without intent to defraud, a dwelling house, public building, motor vehicle or aircraft, personal property of another, etc.

Criminal Homicide-Manslaughter by Negligence-The killing of another person through gross negligence.

Criminal Homicide-Murder and Non-Negligent Manslaughter-The willful (non-negligent) killing of one human being by another.

Robbery-The taking or attempting to take anything of value from the care, custody, or control of a person or persons by force or threat of force or violence and/or by putting the victim in fear.

Aggravated Assault-An unlawful attack by one person upon another for the purpose of inflicting severe or aggravated bodily injury. This type of assault usually is accompanied by the use of a weapon or by means likely to produce death or great bodily harm. (It is not necessary that injury result from an aggravated assault when a gun, knife, or other weapon is used which could and probably would result in serious personal injury if the crime were successfully completed.)

Burglary-The unlawful entry of a structure to commit a felony or a theft. For reporting purposes this definition includes: unlawful entry with intent to commit a larceny or felony; breaking and entering with intent to commit a larceny; housebreaking; safecracking; and all attempts to commit any of the aforementioned.

Motor Vehicle Theft-The theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle. (Classify as motor vehicle theft all cases where automobiles are taken by persons not having lawful access even though the vehicles are later abandoned, including joyriding.)

Weapon Law Violations-The violation of laws or ordinances dealing with weapon offenses, regulatory in nature, such as: manufacture, sale, or possession of deadly weapons; carrying deadly weapons, concealed or openly; furnishing deadly weapons to minors; aliens possessing deadly weapons; and all attempts to commit any of the aforementioned.

Drug Abuse Violations-Violations of State and local laws relating to the unlawful possession, sale, use, growing, manufacturing, and making of narcotic drugs. The relevant substances include: opium or cocaine and their derivatives (morphine, heroin, codeine); marijuana, synthetic narcotics (demerol, methadones); and dangerous non-narcotic drugs (barbiturates, benzedrine).

Liquor Law Violations-The violation of laws or ordinances prohibiting: the manufacture, sale, transporting, furnishing, possessing of intoxicating liquor; maintaining unlawful drinking places; bootlegging; operating a still; furnishing liquor to a minor or intemperate person; using a vehicle for illegal transportation of liquor; drinking on a train or public conveyance; and all attempts to commit any of the aforementioned.

(Drunkenness and driving under the influence are not included in this definition.)

Sex Offenses-Forcible-Any sexual act directed against another person, forcibly and/or against that person's will; or not forcibly or against the person's will where the victim is incapable of giving consent.

Sex Offenses-Non-Forcible-Unlawful, non-f forcible sexual intercourse.

- (A) Incest-Non-Forcible sexual intercourse between persons who are related to each other within the degrees wherein marriage is prohibited by law.
- (B) Statutory Rape-Non-Forcible sexual intercourse with a person who is under the statutory age of consent.
