



COMMENCEMENT ADDRESS

ANN MEIER BAKER

Director of Music & Opera, National Endowmenet for the Arts

Ann Meier Baker was appointed the director of Music & Opera at the National Endowment for the Arts in January 2015. She oversees the NEA's grant making in music and opera including millions of dollars per year in grants for organizations in urban, suburban and rural communities throughout the U.S. She is also responsible for the NEA Jazz Masters Fellowship program, the nation's highest honor in the field of jazz, which includes presenting renowned artists in annual Jazz Masters concerts and other celebratory events in collaboration with high-profile partners. Ms. Baker is the co-leader of the Agency's role in the Sound Health Coalition, along with the National Institutes of Health, the John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts, and Renée Fleming to explore the intersections between music and the brain. She also led the NEA's Creativity Connects Grant Program for projects that connect arts organizations with non-arts entities so that they can use the arts and creativity to forge new approaches to help address a wide variety of societal challenges.

Previously, Ann Meier Baker served as president and CEO of Chorus America, where she led the national membership association of more than 2,000 professional, volunteer, symphonic and children/youth choruses. She has also held leadership positions at the League of American Orchestras, and the National Association for Music Education. A life-long choral singer, she began her career as a public-school music teacher before becoming a professional singer with the United States Air Force Singing Sergeants.

CHARGE TO THE GRADUATING CLASSES

TOM T. SHELTON, JR.

Associate Professor of Sacred Music

Tom T. Shelton, Jr. is an associate professor of Sacred Music at Westminster Choir College, in Princeton, NJ. Focusing on children's and youth music at Westminster, Professor Shelton teaches classes in conducting, sacred music, music education, and conducts the Williamson Voices Treble Ensemble. In addition, he is the director of Children's and Youth Choirs at Princeton United Methodist Church and conducts two ensembles with the Princeton Girlchoir Organization.

Professor Shelton has a passion for music education in all areas: church, school and community. He taught middle school choral music in Winston-Salem/Forsyth County (NC) for 18 years. During that time he was selected Teacher of the Year for both Atkins Middle School and Kernersville Middle School. In 1999 the North Carolina Music Educators Association presented him with the North Carolina Middle School Music Teacher of the Year award.

Professor Shelton is an active member of the American Choral Directors Association, having served as National President (2017-2019). Other ACDA leadership positions have included Southern Region president (2011-2012), National R&S chair for Middle School/Junior High Choirs (2007-2009) and North Carolina president (2005-2007).

Professor Shelton has conducted choral festivals and presented workshops in 22 states as well as Hong Kong. He has conducted Choral Festivals in Carnegie Hall, Honor Choirs for the Central Division ACDA and Southern Division ACDA, as well as All State Choirs in Alabama, Florida, Georgia, Illinois, Kansas, Kentucky, Louisiana, Mississippi, Missouri, New Jersey, New York, North Carolina, South Carolina, South Dakota, Texas and Virginia. Professor Shelton has served as an adjudicator for the Penabur International Choral Festival (Jakarta, Indonesia); the Rovdo International Choral Festival (Belarus); and worked on several projects with the "Soul Sounds Academy" (Sri Lanka). He is the Series Director for the Music for Young Voices Series with GIA Publications and has over 60 compositions published by Choristers Guild, Colla Voce Music, G. Schirmer, Galaxy, GIA Publications, Growing in Grace Curriculum, Heritage Music Press, Hinshaw Music Company, Musicspoke.com, Santa Barbara Music Press, and Walton Music.
