Graduate Music History Placement Exam

The graduate music history diagnostic examination includes five sections, similar to the following:

- 1. Identify the approximate date of composition, the genre and a possible composer of four <u>listening excerpts</u>. Provide at least three rationales for your answer. Each listening excerpt is from a major work in the Western art music repertory.
- 2. Identify the approximate date of composition, genre and possible composer of four <u>scores</u>. Provide at least three rationales for your answer. Each score is from a major work in the Western art music repertory.
- 3. Write a short <u>essay</u> on the history of a major genre in Western art music. You will be given a list of three or four genres from which to choose.
- 4. Write a short <u>essay</u> on your choice of a major genre (traditional or popular) outside Western art music.
- 5. Write a short <u>essay</u> on a significant issue in musicology or ethnomusicology, such as gender, psychology of music, performance practice, the economics of music, ecomusicology, or musical technology.

Essays should be about 1,000 words or 4 pages. Students should plan to spend about 20 minutes on each essay.
