She has been playing since the of age 5 and is a 2017 Westminster Scholarship Competition Winner, 2018 American Fine Arts Concerto Competition Third Place winner, seven-year New Jersey Music Teachers Association (NJMTA) Spring Audition winner, and she has played in multiple chamber ensembles. She is a pianist in the PHS Orchestra and serves her local church as an accompanist. Aside from piano, she has studied the erhu - a traditional Chinese string instrument - since the of age 7 under master Wang Guowei. As current concertmaster and member of the Music From China Youth Orchestra, she has performed in venues including Lincoln Center, Merkin Concert Hall and the Metropolitan Museum of Art, as well as in Taipei and Shanghai. She has also been teaching Chinese music at the Princeton Chinese Language School for four years. Outside of music, she is an avid student journalist and enjoys art, knitting and serving the Princeton community.

YVONNE MACDONALD has been the conductor of the Schola Children's Choir since 2006, and she was the conductor of the Concino Children's Choir from 2006 - 2010. She holds a G.R.S.M. degree and two A.R.C.M. diplomas from the Royal College of Music in London, England. She came to the US in 1965. Mrs. Macdonald's teaching experience includes head of the junior school music department at the Perse School for Girls, Cambridge, England 1962 - 1965; District Music co-coordinator, music teacher and choir director at the West Windsor-Plainsboro Regional School District 1968 - 1999; Adjunct instructor for elementary education at Westminster Choir College of Rider University 2000-2001, and at the Princeton United Methodist Church she was Director of Children and Youth Choirs 1968 - 2014 and Handbell Choir Director 1998-2006. Mrs. Macdonald greatly enjoys making music with children and with youth.

RUTH OCHS is now in her 13th season as conductor and music director of the Westminster Community Orchestra. As the orchestra's conductor, she has led the orchestra in performances of major orchestral and choral-orchestral works, including symphonies by Beethoven, Brahms, Haydn, Mozart, Saint-Saëns, Shostakovich and Tchaikovsky. Under her leadership, the ensemble continues to feature choral ensembles and soloists from the Westminster Conservatory and collaborate with Westminster Choir College students in piano concerto concerts and readings of new music. She is in her 15th season as the conductor of the Princeton University Sinfonia.

Ms. Ochs has been guest conductor for many ensembles, including the Princeton University Orchestra and faculty ensembles at the Westminster Conservatory of Music. Prior

to her work in New Jersey, she was music director of the University Orchestra at the University of Texas at Austin and the Austin Philharmonic, and conducted the top ensembles of the University of Texas School of Music's acclaimed String Project. Ruth Ochs studied conducting at the Pierre Monteux School in Hancock, Maine, with the director Maestro Michael Jinbo. In 2008, she served as the school's first conducting associate.

Ms. Ochs holds degree in music, orchestral conducting and musicology from Harvard University, the University of Texas at Austin and Princeton University, respectively. She also studied at Humboldt Universität in Berlin, Germany, with the support of a Fulbright Fellowship. She is currently a lecturer in the Princeton University Department of Music. She lives in Lawrenceville, N.J., with her husband, cellist Tomasz Rzeczycki, and their sons Sebastian and Krystian.

PATRICIA THEL founded the Children's Choir Program at Westminster Conservatory of Music 25 years ago. Before coming to Princeton, she taught in public schools in the Atlanta, Ga. and Washington, D.C. areas and sang with the Atlanta Symphony Orchestra Chorus under the direction of Robert Shaw. In addition to her work through the Conservatory, she has taught as an adjunct at Westminster Choir College and Ithaca College School of Music. She has served in the Princeton area as the middle school music director at Princeton Day School and the artistic director of the Trenton Children's Chorus, where she presently serves today. Under her direction, the Cantus Choir has performed five times at the White House and once at the National Cathedral in addition to performances at Princeton University and Westminster. The group has performed collaboratively with Trenton Children's Chorus at Princeton University and the United Nations.

A sophomore at Princeton High School, **ANNIE WEI** has been a student of Galina Prilutskaya for the past eight years. She has a passion for all kinds of music and loves going to concerts. Taking every opportunity she has to express her love for music, Ms. Wei is also part of a chamber group, plays in the school orchestra, plays flute and guitar at home, has taken composition and mixed media music classes, and every summer she participates in a music camp, including the Westminster High School Pianist program. She has won various competitions including the NJMTA Young Musician Competition, NJMTA Spring Piano Festival, Princeton Festival and the American Fine Arts music festival. Ms. Wei's interests outside of music include hiking, skiing and running.

commitment and passion of a true community ensemble. The group presents popular programs noted for their diverse repertoire and widespread appeal. In recent years, the Cantus Choir has sung at the White House, the National Cathedral, the United Nations and Weill Recital Hall at Carnegie Hall.

WESTMINSTER CHOIR COLLEGE'S OPERA WORKSHOP is an auditioned class that casts graduate and upper-level undergraduate students in scenes chosen to forward the singers' vocal and dramatic abilities while modeling professional expectations and demands.
