ES Program to present Undergraduate Business Concept Competition in the Spring

The first annual Rider Collegiate Business Concept Competition will give undergraduates the opportunity to get rewarded for their innovative business ideas. Any Rider undergraduate student is eligible to compete simply by writing a 400-word description of their concept and submitting it to the website by the March 19, 2018 entry deadline. Go to <u>www.Rider.edu/riderbusinesscompetition</u> and click on the entry on the left. First prize will be \$500 and second prize is \$250.

We will have a live Competition Finale on Wednesday, April 11, 2108, when the top five finalists from the pool of submissions will pitch their ideas to a panel of entrepreneurial judges.

Using our successful high school competition as a model, the Collegiate Business Concept Competition gives all Rider undergrads the opportunity to develop their writing and presentation skills in articulating an innovative business concept, while developing each part of their concept to create a holistic plan. These concepts can also be developed by individuals or by teams.

Lisa Teach, coordinator of the competition and an ES Center Entrepreneur-in-Residence, will be holding an information session on Thursday, February 1, 2018 on campus to help any interested undergrads hone in on their business ideas.

This allows the Center to load state of the art software on up to 10 computers on campus so students and staff can develop their models. These models can then be created on our 3-D printers






Alumni Guest Article: Jessica Layton '15

Last summer, veterans completed the first phase of the 2017 Veteran Entrepreneurship Training (VET) program at Rider. The free nine-week program combines classroom teaching with mentoring to help veterans pursue a venture concept.

The competition is open to high school sophomores, juniors and seniors; however, it now has two categories, each with its own set of prizes:

1. Senfors will compete for a four-year, full-tuition scholarship to Rider University and a trophysfor their high school.

2. Soppomores and juniors will compete for \$750, a trophy for their high school and automatic entrance to the finals when they are a senior.

The top five finalists in each category will be invited to present their business concept at Rider before a panel of judges on Jan. 17, 2018 in a live finale, followed by a celebration banquet.

"The competition has grown in its previous three years and, with Norm's incredible support, took another huge leap forward this year," said Dr. Ron Cook, director of the Center for Entrepreneurial Studies and Associate Dean of the College of Business.
